Check-In is responsible for reaching out and keeping in phone and mail contact with clients of the agency. Check-In volunteers provide information and referrals, along with a sensitive and caring ear, to AIDS Action Committee's clients, and help maintain a strong connection between clients and staff members.

The Check-In Volunteer position is demanding, challenging and immensely rewarding. It requires excellent listening skills, compassion, patience and the ability to talk with people from all walks of life. All of our volunteers are asked to be compassionate and non-judgmental as well as sensitive to HIV-related issues. They should be prepared to deal with ongoing life issues, losses, challenges and triumphs. The Check-In program requires its

volunteers to make at least a one year commitment of one shift per week on a Tuesday or Wednesday evening from approximately 6-9pm.

Breakthrough Cambridge

Breakthrough Cambridge (BTC) is a year-round academic enrichment program that creates paths to college for Cambridge Public School students with high potential but limited opportunities, while

promoting careers in education. Using a student's-teaching-students model, BTC provides dynamic, tuition-free academic programs in the summer and during the school year. Our students commit to completing two years of our intensive after-school and summer programs during middle school. In return, BTC commits to providing six years of academic support, lasting throughout high school and culminating in hands-on assistance to students as they apply to college.

Beginning junior year, BTC works one-on-one with students through each step of the college application process. We are seeking several College Access Coaches, who will be trained to work with our 11th and 12th grade students throughout their college application process. Each coach will be matched with 1-2 students based on availability, and must commit to approximately 1-2 hours per week per student. We prefer a 1-year commitment but are open to discussing the possibility of single semesters. The College Access Coach is a volunteer position which nonetheless requires a serious and consistent commitment. Given the nature of this work with students, undergraduates, graduate students, and young professionals are all welcome to apply.

City Year

City Year was founded in 1988 on the belief that young people can change the world. City Year is an education focused, nonprofit organization that unites young people of all backgrounds for a year of full-time service to keep students in school and on track to graduation. At City Year's 21 urban locations across the United States and two international affiliates, teams of trained young people

called corps members serve full-time in schools for the academic year as tutors, mentors and role models. By focusing on attendance, behavior and course performance, which identify students who are at risk of dropping out, corps members are uniquely able to help students and schools succeed.

Beginning each day before the first school bell rings and staying until the last child leaves the after-school program; you'll serve students, schools and communities through:

- **Academic Support:** Provide one-on-one or small group tutoring before, during and after school
- **Attendance and Positive Behavior Encouragement:** Lead energetic morning greetings, make attendance and positive phone calls to home, lead mentor groups
- **Community and School Improvements:** Organize and lead activities, celebrations and projects to improve the community and school environment

Cristo Rey Boston High School

Cristo Rey Boston is a Catholic College Preparatory High School founded in 2004 and is part of the Cristo Rey Network. We are located in Dorchester, right across from the Savin Hill Subway stop. The school is committed to educating low-income students in the greater Boston area to achieve personal and academic success by using proven best practices for teaching and instruction. The school focuses on students who will be the first in their families to attend college. Our goal is to send all students to four year colleges.

Our students enter our school in 9th grade and are, on average, a year to a year and a half below grade level in math and English. We remediate these skills (basic math, grammar, essay writing) outside of the classroom, with extensive use of tutors, in order to be able to devote class time to our rigorous ninth grade curriculum. We are actively looking for tutors for this program, who can work with freshmen in basic math and grammar skills.

In addition, we are looking for tutors in a variety of academic subjects. Most in demand are math tutors (Algebra I & II, Geometry, Precalculus, and AP Calculus) and Science tutors (Chemistry and Physics). But we also consistently need tutors in the humanities – English, History, and Spanish. **Our** most successful tutors have often been college students – due to their dedication, recent experiences with much of the subject matter, and ability to relate to our students.

We run tutoring programs for 9th grade remediation throughout the school day (7:30-3:05) and tutor for academic coursework after school (3:15 on).

7. Visit patients in their homes or at in-patient facility.
8. Provide childcare.
9. Read to patients
10. Help patients write letters.

Although volunteers cannot provide physical care for patients, they can do many things that add to the comfort and quality of life for patients and families. Volunteers welcome the chance to help in whatever way they are needed.
