Stefanie Chambers is an assistant professor of political science at Trinity College in Hartford Connecticut. She earned her Ph.D. from Ohio State University in 1999. Her research interests include urban politics, urban education policy, and racial and ethnic politics.

Robert Chisholm teaches political science and history at Columbia Basin College in Pasco, Washington. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh and his M. A. from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario. His teaching and research interests include Latin American political development, the history of political thought, military history, and the expansion of suffrage and political representation in Latin America since independence.

Laurel Elder is an Associate Professor of Political Science at Hartwick College in Oneonta, New York. She received her Ph.D. from Ohio State University in 1999. Her areas of research include public opinion, voting behavior, and the politics of race, ethnicity and gender.

Roger D. Masters is Nelson A. Rockefeller Professor Emeritus and Research Professor, Department of Government, Dartmouth College. After a B. A. from Harvard and military service, he completed his Ph.D. at the University of Chicago with a Doctoral Dissertation on the Political Thought of Rousseau under the direction of Leo Strauss. Extensive publication and teaching in political theory led to the realization that traditional philosophic analyses of “human nature” should confront developments in the biological sciences. Working in the new field of “bio-politics” over the last 20 years, he has recently focused on the

effects of neurotoxins on behavior – an important area with policy implications epitomized by the work on silicofluorides summarized by his current article.

Christopher Newman is Professor of Political Science at Elgin Community College and Adjunct Professor at Roosevelt University. He is the president of the Illinois Political Science Association and the American Association for History and Computing. He also is a member of the board of Humanitarian Efforts for African Learning. He is also a member of the New England Complex Systems Institute and the North American Sun Style Tai Chi Research Foundation. He has spent the last several years applying complex systems methodology to political and historical theories.
