Our Mission

The men and women of the Northeastern University Police Department are dedicated to providing the Northeastern University community with a comprehensive program of police, security, crime prevention, emergency medical, fire safety, parking, and related public safety services to help ensure that the campus community remains a safe and pleasant place in which to live, work, and study.

Preface

The following information is being provided to you as part of Northeastern University's commitment to safety and security on campus and is in compliance with the requirements of the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act.

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, part of the Higher Education Act of 1965, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. Publishing an annual report every year by October 1st that contains three years' worth of campus crime statistics and certain security policy statements including sexual assault policies which assure basic victims' right, the law enforcement authority of campus police and where students should go to report crimes. Each school must disclose crime statistics for the campus, public areas immediately adjacent to or running through the campus, and non-campus facilities.

Persons responsible for reporting crimes and other Clery reportable offenses to the Northeastern University Police are known as "Campus Security Authorities" (CSAs). They are identified as Deans, Directors, and Department heads who have significant responsibility for students, employees and campus activities including, but not limited to student housing, student discipline, campus judicial proceedings, diversity and inclusion, and any other official such as advisors who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution.

Campus Security Authorities are responsible to report, in a timely and good faith manner, the following crimes to the Northeastern University Police: murder, non-negligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible and non-forcible sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, and bias motivated incidents involving larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, and destruction/damage/vandalism of property that are motivated by race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, disability, national origin, and gender identity. They are also required to report incidents involving liquor law violations, drug violations, and weapons violations that occur on campus, in or on non-campus buildings or property owned or controlled by the university, and public property within or immediately adjacent to our campus.

The annual security report is prepared by the Northeastern University Police Department. The annual security report statistics are compiled by utilizing the following sources: NUPD case reports, Boston Police and/or other police agencies case reports where the Clery reportable crimes occurred on campus, public areas immediately adjacent to or running through campus, and, non-campus facilities. These reports are cross-referenced to ensure duplication of statistics does not occur.

Law Enforcement Authority and Interagency Relationships

University police officers are commissioned in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 22C Section 63 of the Massachusetts General Laws and have full law enforcement authority, which includes authority to fully investigate and power of arrest, in and upon all property owned, occupied or used by the University.

The Department recognizes its responsibility to provide crime prevention and emergency police services to members of the Northeastern community while they are in the immediate campus neighborhood, as well as when they are on official campus property. To that end, University police officers also hold commissions as Deputy Sheriffs in Suffolk County, providing them with the authority to exercise police duties on the public streets and other areas of the city contiguous to the campus. Full-time Community Service Officers and students majoring in Criminal Justice employed as co-operative education Police Cadets supplement the full-time professional police officers, bringing the total number of police and security staff to approximately ninety men and women.

All newly appointed University Police Officers are graduates of a police academy conducted or sanctioned by the Massachusetts State Police or Massachusetts Police Training Committee. Recruit training academies consist of several months of full-time, in-depth training in all aspects of police operations and are followed by several weeks of field training under the close supervision of a Police Training Officer. Annual in-service refresher training is provided to all officers, and officers are also frequently assigned to attend in-depth training in a wide variety of specialized topics such as crime

prevention theory and the investigation of sexual assaults and bias-motivated crime, as well as other subjects which enhance the ability of the Division to provide comprehensive public safety services.

The Northeastern University Police Department (NUPD) maintains a close working relationship with the Boston Police Department, state and federal law enforcement agencies and all appropriate elements of the criminal justice system. Crime related reports and statistics are routinely exchanged. A formal written agreement outlines the policy and procedures whereby NUPD officers have direct radio access to the Boston Police to ensure effective coordination between departments during emergencies. NUPD collaborates with local law enforcement agencies that respond to or investigate alleged criminal activity involving students, including when such activity occurs at any non-campus location of a registered student organization. NUPD is accredited by the Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission and is certified by the Massachusetts State Police. NUPD Detectives are affiliates of the Boston Regional Intelligence Center where they regularly receive and exchange information related to crime trends and homeland security with their local, state and federal law enforcement colleagues.

The Command and Supervisory staffs of the Department are encouraged to participate actively in professional associations which foster increased proficiency in their areas of responsibility. Members of the staff maintain active membership as well as leadership positions in the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators, the Northeast Colleges and Universities Security Association, the Massachusetts Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators, the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association, the Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission, the Greater Boston Campus Police Criminal Information Exchange, the Massachusetts Police Training Officers Association, and the New England Campus Fire Safety Officers Association.

Reporting Crimes and Emergencies

The Northeastern University Police Department provides a comprehensive program of police, security, crime prevention, fire safety, emergency medical, and public safety services to help ensure that the University community remains a safe and pleasant place in which to study, live and work.

Members of the Northeastern University community, including students and employees, are encouraged to report crimes, suspicious activity or other emergencies to the Northeastern University Police Department immediately, or as soon as possible if the victim is initially unable to file a report. The Department's Headquarters is located at Columbus Place (716 Columbus Avenue) and can be contacted by calling 617.373.2121. To report emergencies of Police or Medical nature, the number is 617.373.3333. Calls are answered 24-hours a day every day by full-time trained Communications Officers at the Department's Police Operations Center. Campus Assistance telephones identified by a blue light are located throughout the campus and can be used to report crimes or other types of emergencies or to call any on-campus extension. Confidential and anonymous reports will be accepted and included in the annual security report, but, confidential and anonymous reports may significantly limit the ability of the Police Department to fully investigate and address the alleged crime. The University encourages University pastoral and professional counselors to verbally inform any persons' they are counseling, if and when they deem appropriate, of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

The Northeastern University Police Department maintains direct contact with the Boston Police and Fire Departments, ensuring prompt assistance and support from these agencies when needed.

Security Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs

The Northeastern University Police Department believes it is more beneficial to prevent crimes than to react to them after the fact. A primary vehicle for accomplishing this goal is the Department's comprehensive crime prevention program. This program is based upon the concepts of eliminating or minimizing criminal opportunities, whenever possible, and encouraging students and employees to be responsible for their own security and the security of others.

The following is a listing of the crime prevention programs and projects employed by Northeastern University which are primarily conducted by members of the Northeastern University Police Departments' Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit (CPCE):

1. **Personal Safety Escort Program**...available 24/7 every day of the year and provides personal safety escorts for:
A: persons walking from one point on campus to another point on campus whenever personal safety is a concern.
B: students traveling from the campus to their off-campus residence after dark, if within approximately one and a half miles of the campus. We also offer a **RED EYE** off campus van service that has pick-ups at the Forsyth Circle and the Snell Library Quad. The van services runs daily from 7PM-6AM with pick-ups every twenty minutes. Extended service during finals as determined. The van will drive students to their residences up to 1.50 miles from campus.
2. **New Student Orientation**...the Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit present crime awareness and prevention information as part of the university's formal orientation programs for new students and their parents every summer and at the start of every semester throughout the academic year. This includes both presentations, and safety and security brochures provided at crime prevention tables that cover tips and strategies on how to be responsible for their own security and security of others. Similar presentations are made during prospective student open houses hosted by the Admissions Department.
3. **Residence Hall Security**...the Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit works closely with the Department of Residential Life and the Residential Safety Office and promote safety in the residence halls through training and education of staff and residents. This training is conducted for Resident Assistants and Resident Directors as well, and is conducted every academic semester. Training sessions with the Department of Residential Life and the Residential Safety Office cover the security procedures and practices within the Northeastern residence halls and encourages ways to look out for the community members to look out for themselves and others around them.
4. **Emergency Telephones**...are located throughout the campus and are tested monthly to ensure proper functioning.
5. **Crime Prevention Presentations**...are primarily given by the Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit who promote crime awareness and prevention programs in residence halls, academic departments, classroom settings, and professional staff environments multiple times per year. Programs are tailored to the particular topics of requests and interests of students and employees and are provided upon requests. Additionally, Northeastern University Police Departments' Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit include crime prevention tips and strategies through video messages called "A Quick Heads up" several times throughout the year, which is featured on NUPD's social media sites. Crime Prevention presentations address both security procedures and practices, as well encourages Northeastern community members to lookout for themselves and others.
6. **New Employee Orientation**...new employees are provided with campus safety and security information at the start of their employment at Northeastern, to include safety and security presentations, and safety and security brochures that cover tips and strategies on how to be responsible for their own security and security of others.
7. **Rape Awareness, Education and Prevention**...the Police Department is a partner in the ViSION Program – Violence, Support, Intervention and Outreach at Northeastern – a coalition of professionals representing the University

Health and Counseling Center, the Office of Prevention and Education at Northeastern (OPEN), the Department of Residence Life, the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution and the Police Department. Specially trained Police Officers present programs dealing with domestic violence, rape, and sexual assault, and train women in the Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) method of self-defense as well as the Self-defense Awareness and Familiarization Exchange (SAFE) program. The RAD program is a 12 hour course that is offered at least once a year by NUPD. The SAFE program is a condensed version of the RAD program that is a 2 hour long course, and it is offered upon request all year long. These programs provide members of the Northeastern Community a hands-on understanding of ways to lookout for and protect themselves and others.

8. **Parking Facility Security**...parking facilities are staffed by trained parking facility employees and/or security officers and are regularly patrolled by University police; emergency phones and CCTV augment security and lighting is well maintained.
9. **Security and Fire Alarm Systems**...a sophisticated computer-enhanced alarm system monitors a campus-wide network of intrusion, fire and duress alarms. The alarms are tested monthly to ensure proper functioning.
10. **Architectural Design**...technical and crime prevention specialists work closely with design engineers regarding physical security systems and fire safety equipment when new construction or major renovations are planned on campus. The Northeastern University Police Department subscribes to the proven concepts and principles of crime and fire prevention through environmental design (CPTED).
11. **Security Surveys**...comprehensive physical and operational security surveys are frequently conducted by Crime Prevention Officers to assist members of the Northeastern Community to improve the security of their work places and personal belongings. Security assessments are available all year long and are provided upon request. Security assessments provide members of the Northeastern Community an in depth understanding of security procedures and practices, as well as ways to lookout for themselves and others within their environment.
12. **Facilities Surveys**...a comprehensive program designed to identify and correct deficiencies in exterior lighting, locking hardware and safety of the grounds is conducted by members of the Department on an ongoing basis.
13. **Laptop and Bicycle Theft Prevention** ...the Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit promotes laptop and bicycle theft prevention and advises students, staff and faculty on the use of techniques and products to minimize theft of valuable personal items of their own and of others such as cell phones, i-Pods, i-Pads, etc. This prevention effort is done through crime prevention tables, crime prevention talks, crime prevention discussions, and through social media throughout the year. Registration of laptops and bicycles with Northeastern University Police is available 24/7 every day of the year.
14. **Crime Prevention Tables**...brochures, posters, bookmarks and other materials carrying crime prevention and awareness information related to residence hall safety and security, domestic violence, sexual assault, bicycle security, the escort service, employee security, motor vehicle security and library security are widely distributed at crime prevention tables staffed by officers at various locations on the campus at least twice each month, or as frequently as requested by the Northeastern community. Crime Prevention Tables cover security procedures and practices, as well as encourages the community to look out for themselves and others.
15. **Timely Warnings**...in cases where the Chief of Police or his designee determines that a crime or crime trend represents a serious or continuing threat to students or employees a Timely Warning will be distributed in order to alert the campus community so they can take precautions to aid in the prevention of further crimes. These warnings may be distributed utilizing the *SafeNet* email or one or more of the communications systems utilized for imminent campus emergencies as outlined in the Emergency Notification Systems and Procedures section of this report, or other methods deemed appropriate by the Chief of Police on a case by case basis.
16. **University Police Officers and Community Services Officers**...work closely with residential life staff, student leaders and employee groups to address safety and security issues on campus. Special emphasis is given to maintenance of campus lighting and emergency telephones, directed patrols of potential trouble spots, and facilitating the exchange of ideas and information designed to minimize crime and disorder, especially in the residence hall communities.

Emergency Medical Services

Most Northeastern University Officers are also certified as Emergency Medical Technicians and all officers are certified CPR First Responders. Fully-equipped emergency medical supply kits including automatic external defibrillators (AED) are carried in all University Police cruisers, and additional AEDs are installed at publicly accessible locations in various campus buildings. Many officers are certified cardiopulmonary resuscitation instructors who regularly present CPR classes to student and employee groups.

Access to Campus Facilities

Most campus buildings and facilities, other than student residence halls, are accessible to members of the campus community, their guests and visitors during normal hours of business, and during designated hours on weekends and holidays, depending on the wide variety of events and activities taking place outside the normal business hours.

Doors to residence halls remain locked 24 hours a day. Proctors monitor access at most residence halls and access is permitted to residents upon presentation of a valid student ID card. Residence is verified by an electronic access control system. Guests and visitors must present a photo ID to the Proctor and be signed in by their host.

Residence halls are equipped with intrusion alarms on exterior doors as well as alarms to detect doors which have been propped open. These alarms are monitored at the Northeastern University Police Operations Center and University Police are dispatched to investigate each alarm.

The University provides housing for some students through agreements with realty management firms for spaces in buildings not managed by Northeastern University. These facilities follow security and fire codes in accordance with the City of Boston regulations.

Maintenance and Security of Campus Grounds and Facilities

The University maintains a very strong commitment to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting is an important part of this commitment. Parking areas, pedestrian walkways and building exteriors are well lighted. Surveys of exterior lighting on campus are conducted regularly by Officers and Physical Plant Facilities staff and high priority is given to maintenance of exterior lights. Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies to the Northeastern University Police Department and/or Facilities Department.

The exterior doors of the campus office and academic buildings are locked following the last class each evening. Door and locking hardware deficiencies are reported to the Facilities Department immediately upon discovery by the Public Safety staff. Shrubbery and trees on campus are trimmed on a regular basis.

Campus streets, parking areas, grounds and buildings are patrolled 24 hours a day every day of the year by University Police Officers, Community Services Officers and co-operative education students employed as Police Cadets. Patrols of residence halls include the perimeter as well as lobbies, cafeterias and basements. Contract security officers supplement the Department's officers, providing a visible deterrent to crime and serving as additional "eyes and ears" for the University Police.

Emergency Notification Systems and Procedures

In the event of a serious incident which poses an immediate threat to members of the Northeastern University community, the University has various systems in place for communicating information quickly to those individuals. Upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of the students or employees occurring on campus, some or all of these methods of communication may be activated. These methods of communications may include activating NU ALERT, an emergency notification system utilizing email, text messaging and telephone voice messaging; messages displayed on electronic message boards on campus; or messages on the home page of Northeastern's website. Phone numbers and email addresses of parents or other persons identified by students or employees in official University registrar or employee records as emergency contact persons will be included in the NU ALERT system and they may receive emergency messages as well. The University will also post updates during a critical incident on the Northeastern University home page at www.northeastern.edu.

Serious threats of this nature may involve weather, health, or personal safety situations. Based on the nature of the emergency the responsibility for assessing the severity of the threat begins with the senior staff of the University Health and Counseling Center, Facilities Department, Office of Environmental Health and Safety, Office of Emergency Management, or the Police Department. Upon a determination by the appropriate department that a significant threat exists, the senior staff of the department will immediately inform the Police Department, who will promptly make a decision regarding the initiation of an emergency notification and/or building evacuation. Staff from either the Police Department or the Office of Emergency

Management will generally have the responsibility for preparing and disseminating emergency messages and updates. Messages will generally be disseminated to the entire campus impacted by the emergency situation unless the situation calls for targeted messaging determined by the Police Department or Office of Emergency Management. Timeliness is a priority during emergency notification. The University Crisis Management Team would subsequently be convened to manage the emergency situation and provide additional follow up communications, as necessary. The greater community will receive necessary messaging provided by the Northeastern University Office of Media & Press Relations through various news media outlets, such as local television and radio stations.

Many factors are considered when assessing a situation to determine whether to activate one or more of the emergency communications systems and if so, the content of the message and whether to send the emergency message to all or some of the campus community. Among the factors to be considered is the nature and anticipated duration of the emergency situation and whether the emergency applies to a particular building or segment of the population or to the entire campus. The Chief of Police, the University Emergency Manager, Police Department Supervisors, or a lead member of the University Crisis Management Team will make a decision without delay, taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The University Crisis Management Team in coordination with the Office of Emergency Management plans, publicizes, and conducts a test of the emergency response and notification system at least annually and maintains a record documenting each test, including a description of the exercise, the date, time and whether it was announced or unannounced.

Campus Crime Notifications

Numerous efforts are made to advise members of the campus community on a timely basis about campus crime and crime-related problems. These efforts include the following:

1. **Timely Warnings** ... Notifications issued to the entire University community that are based upon a serious or continuing threat to the safety and security of the University community. These types of notifications are intended to inform and reduce the risk of these threats through crime prevention measures. *NUPD Advisories* are disseminated to the University community, or specific groups within the community, by email in the event of specific crime patterns or to inform the community about relevant safety awareness campaigns.
2. **Special and Emergency Alerts**...*The Huntington News* features a weekly Crime Log providing details of crimes reported on and near the campus. A campus emergency alert system (NU ALERT) utilizing telephone, email and text messaging is used to notify students and employees of weather emergencies and on confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation on campus involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students and staff. Students and employees are reminded to keep their personal telephone numbers, email address and text messaging information updated on the *MyNEU* portal to ensure receipt of emergency messages. One or more of these methods is used whenever the Chief of Police, the University Emergency Manager, or the University Crisis Management Team determines that a situation exists which constitutes an imminent threat to members of the campus community.
3. **Annual Reports**...This Safety, Security and Fire Safety Information Report is published annually and distributed throughout the University community and is available to the media and any individual or organization requesting a copy. Northeastern also participates in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Program, providing monthly reports of crimes reported on campus for inclusion in the annual publication of the U.S. Department of Justice entitled *Crime in the United States*.
4. **Student Newspaper**...*The Huntington News* publishes a crime log of campus incidents in every edition. Special articles concerning security issues also appear frequently.
5. **Public Log**...a chronological record of all crimes, fires and other significant incidents reported to University Police, as well as the names of all persons arrested, is maintained at Police Department Headquarters Administrative Office and is available for viewing during regular office hours, Monday through Friday.

Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking

The University prohibits dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking. The definitions of each criminal offense in Massachusetts are as follows:

Domestic Violence is a crime of violence intended to inflict physical, sexual, and psychological harm on a:

- current or former spouse of the victim;
- person with whom the victim shares a child in common;
- person who is a current or former roommate of the victim
- person who is a relative of the victim by either blood or marriage

Dating Violence is a crime of violence committed by a person:

- who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and
- where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
- the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship

Sexual Assaults (Sex Offenses) are defined as any sexual act directed against another person, without consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

- **Rape** is the penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus, with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. This offense includes the rape of both males and females.
- **Fondling** is the touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of her or his age or because of her or his temporary or permanent mental capacity.
- **Statutory Rape** is defined as sexual assault of an individual under the age of 16 with or without their consent.
- **Incest** is intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Stalking is defined as a willful and /or malicious pattern of conduct or series of acts directed at a specific person, which seriously alarms or annoys that person and would cause a reasonable person to suffer substantial emotional distress.

Examples of stalking include, but not limited to; conduct, acts or threats conducted in person, or by mail, phone, electronic communication, or social media.

Consent is a voluntary affirmative agreement to engage in sexual activity proposed by another and requires mutually understandable and communicated words and/or actions demonstrating agreement by both parties to participate in all sexual activities. Appropriate sexual behavior requires consent from all involved parties. Consent must be freely informed without physical force, threats, intimidation behavior, duress, or coercion. Silence, a lack of resistance, previous sexual relationships or experiences, and/or a current relationship may not, in themselves, be taken to imply consent. The initiator, or the person who wants to engage in the specific sexual activity, must obtain consent from the partner(s) for each sexual act; both parties may be initiators at different points of sexual activity; a person's initiation of a sexual act constitutes consent to that act; but not necessarily to subsequent acts. Consent to sexual activity may be withdrawn at any time, as long as the withdrawal is communicated in mutually understandable words and/ or actions; sexual activity must cease immediately. **Note:** Intoxicated persons **do not** have the ability to give consent.

Victims of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking are urged to report the incident to Northeastern University Police (617.373.2121) or the Office of Gender Equity and Compliance (617.373.4644) as soon as possible, regardless of where the offense took place, whether or not the offender is known to the victim. University policy dictates that University officials who are informed of a crime of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, in their official capacity as University employees are to encourage the victim to make a report to Northeastern Police, other off-

campus law enforcement authorities, or to the Office of Gender Equity and Compliance. University Police work closely with the victim to ensure that the appropriate medical care and counseling is made available.

The preservation of evidence in any incident of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking is extremely important as it may assist in proving that the alleged offense occurred, or it may be helpful in obtaining a protection order.

In cases of a sexual assault, victims can elect to have a forensic examination done at a local hospital from a specially trained SANE nurse (sexual assault nurse examiner). There are SANE nurses on call at the Beth Israel Hospital (617.667.7000) / 330 Brookline Ave, Boston, MA 02215); Boston Medical Center (617.638.8000 / One Medical Center Place, Boston, MA 02118), and Brigham & Women's Hospital (617.732.5500 / 75 Francis Street, Boston, MA 02115). Choosing to obtain a forensic examination does not require the victim to file a police report. Having a forensic examination conducted does help to preserve evidence should the victim choose to file a police report at a later time.

Victims of sexual assaults are not required to file formal criminal charges, even if they report the incident to the University Police. A University Police investigator, specially trained in dealing with victims of sexual assault, will present the victim with a full range of options and services available so the victim can choose the most appropriate course of action. Furthermore victims' names are never made public; Massachusetts law requires that the identity of a sexual assault survivor be kept confidential.

Students accused of sexual assault are subject to disciplinary action in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Student Conduct as contained in the official Student Handbook, whether or not formal criminal charges are filed by the victim.

Filing for a Protection Order

No Contact Orders

Victims of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking can request to have the University issue a "no contact" order against the accused person of that crime if the accused person is a Northeastern affiliate. Victims can make the request for a "no contact" order by contacting one of the following departments: the Northeastern University Police Department (617.373.2121), the Office of Gender Equity and Compliance (617.373.4644), the Office of Institutional Diversity and Inclusion (617.373.2133), the Department of Residential Life (617.373.2814), or by filing a report online to the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (OSCCR) through their website (www.northeastern.edu/osCCR). A victim will need to disclose enough information to substantiate the reason for the "no contact" request. The department receiving the request for a "no contact" order will then submit a report describing the basis for the request to OSCCR. OSCCR will then honor the request for such an order, and will issue a "no contact" order between both the victim and accused. If a violation of the "no contact" order occurs, the victim should promptly report the violation to Northeastern University Police Department or OSCCR.

"No Contact" orders direct both the victim and the accused to have no contact or communications whatsoever with each other. This order includes direct or intentional communication or contact via phone, e-mail, instant or text messages, social media or through a third party. Violation of a "no contact" order may result in further disciplinary action being imposed on the accused. "No Contact" orders differ from restraining orders as it does not prevent the accused from being in the same building, area, etc. as the victim.

Restraining Orders

The Abuse Prevention Law, Chapter 209A was enacted to help keep victims from being abused. The Abuse Prevention Law, most commonly known as a restraining order, will allow the court to issue a protection order notifying your abuser to stop the abuse. The police are responsible for enforcing the violation of the restraining order.

Protection offered under the Abuse Prevention Law only applies to "family or household members" which are defined by M.G.L. c209A s.1 as people who are or were:

- Married; or
- Living together; or
- Related by blood or marriage; or
- Parents of a common child regardless of whether they have ever been married or lived together; or
- Involved in a substantial dating or engagement relationship

If you decide to file a complaint for a restraining order or have questions regarding a restraining order, contact the Northeastern University Police Department at 617.373.2121 and we will assist you during the following process.

Victims are required to file an application for a Complaint for Protection from Abuse at the local court (this is a civil complaint, not a criminal one). Afterwards, you will speak to a judge or clerk to explain what happened and why you need protection. The judge will then decide whether to grant a Temporary Order valid for ten (10) business days. If the Temporary Order is granted, you will be given a copy of the order and summons to return to court within ten (10) business days for a hearing. The abuser will also be sent a summons to appear and the police will attempt to serve the order to the abuser. The “10 day hearing” is when the judge will decide whether or not to extend the order. The hearing will allow both the victim and the abuser an opportunity to tell what happened.

You are allowed to bring any witnesses or evidence you might have to support your testimony. If the abuser does not appear, the hearing will still be held and may result in the order being extended. The victim must appear at this hearing or the order will automatically be vacated. The judge will make a determination after hearing testimony if the order will be vacated or extended.

If you need immediate protection from your abuser contact the Northeastern University Police Department at 617.373.3333 or if off-campus, but in Boston call 617.343.4911. If you are outside of Boston, call 911.

Consider ways to leave your present situation safely. The police will assist you in obtaining an Emergency Restraining Order valid until the next court business day. Once the order has been issued you will be given a copy and the police will attempt to serve a copy to the abuser.

Violation of an Abuse Prevention Order is a crime. If your abuser violates the order call the police immediately. If you are on campus, reside in Northeastern University housing or in the immediate area call 617.373.3333. If you are off campus, but in Boston call 617.373.4911. If you are outside of Boston, call 911. Explain to the police that your abuser has violated the restraining order and you need help right away. If the abuser has left the scene, try to provide the direction of flight and a physical clothing description. If the police are unable to locate the abuser, the Northeastern University Police Department will assist you in going to court where you may file an application for a criminal complaint.

Remember to keep the order on you at all times. Inform family, friends, neighbors and roommates that you have a restraining order. Do not hesitate to call the police immediately if the abuser violates the order.

If you are leaving an abusive relationship, remember leaving a violent relationship can be very difficult and dangerous; make sure you have a safety plan in place. Know ahead of time a safe place you can go to in an emergency. Bring along with you important documents (driver’s license, bankbooks, custody documents, etc.) and tell a friend. Let someone you trust help you make the first step.

Harassment Orders

All members of the Northeastern University community have the right to be free from being harassed and or placed in fear. The law has provided victims of harassment with the ability to obtain relief from the courts even though there is no relationship with the abuser. The Harassment Prevention Order, Massachusetts General Law 258E, fills a critical gap in the law to protect victims of criminal harassment, stalking, or sexual assault from being harassed repeatedly regardless of their relationship with the perpetrator.

If you are a victim of harassment, contact the Northeastern University Police immediately for assistance or your local police where you live. The procedure for filing for a Harassment Prevention Order is the same as filing for a restraining order described above.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual Harassment is any unwanted or offensive sexual behavior that has the purpose or effect of creating a hostile or stressful living, learning, or working environment, or whenever toleration of such conduct or the rejection of it is the basis for a personal or academic decision affecting the individual. Examples of such behavior include but are not limited to:

- A. Sexual advances; any form of retaliation or threat of retaliation against and individual who rejects such advances; sexually epithets, jokes, or comments, comment or injury about and individual's body or sexual experiences; unwelcomed leering, whistling, or name calling; sexual gestures, displaying sexually suggestive photos, cartoons, or videos.
- B. Direct or indirect threats or bribes for unwanted sexual activity; repeatedly asking for a date, sex, or another form of intimacy; touching, patting, punching, stroking, squeezing, tickling, or brushing against a person; spreading rumors about a person's sexuality; or letters, notes, texts, emails, or other forms of communication of material of a sexual nature.
- C. Exposing one's genitals or other intimate body parts to a particular person or to the general public.

Rights and Responsibilities Under Title IX

Victims of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault or/ or stalking are strongly encouraged to report these offenses as follows. Any person may report allegations of or information relating to an occurrence of a Prohibited Offense to any of the following offices: the Northeastern University Police Department ("NUPD"); the Office Gender Equity and Compliance ("OGEC"); the Office for Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution ("OSCCR"); University Health and Counseling Services ("UHCS"); the Office of the Dean of Students and/ or the Office for Residential Life ("ResLife"). Faculty and staff with information relating to an allegation of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and/ or stalking must immediately report such information to OGEC or NUPD. Victims seeking to report a Prohibited Offense in confidence may do so to sexual assault counselors in UHCS.

Upon receipt of such information, any of the above-listed offices will immediately report such information to NUPD or OGEC, which will promptly take steps to address any immediate threats to the Victim or University community. The University will conduct a prompt, fair and impartial investigation into the allegations. Under limited circumstances

where the University's investigation may negatively impact an ongoing criminal investigation, the University may delay its investigation for a reasonable period of time, which will generally not exceed 10 days. The University expects to complete its investigation into and adjudication of allegations within 60 days. However, extenuating circumstances (e.g. the unavailability of necessary witnesses, a large number of witnesses) may require longer than 60 days to resolve in a fair and impartial manner.

The University utilizes a "preponderance of the evidence" standard in the adjudication of all complaints of Prohibited Offenses within a University process. The Code of Student Conduct and its applicable procedures will govern the adjudication of allegations involving students. Specific timeframes for each step in the conduct process are outlined in the Code. All Student Conduct Board members who hear cases regarding domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking receive training that includes the University's responsibilities under Title IX and the Clery Act. Both the Victim and the Respondent are entitled to the same opportunities to present information and witnesses, consistent with applicable University procedures. Both have the opportunity to choose a hearing advisor of their choice, and both are informed simultaneously in-writing of the outcome. Both parties have the right to file an appeal of the outcome on grounds described in the Code. The result becomes final after resolution of an appeal or if no appeal is filed.

Allegations involving employees, community members and third parties will be adjudicated in accordance with the Respondent's role and relationship with the University. Any dispute regarding the applicable procedures for adjudication (e.g. where a Respondent is both an employee and student) will be resolved in the sole discretion of the Title IX Coordinator.

University community members found responsible for a Prohibited Offense may be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with applicable University policy, whether or not criminal charges are filed by the Victim. A student found responsible for a Prohibited Offense will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion from the University. An employee found responsible for a Prohibited Offense in violation of Title IX will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including separation from the University.

Students will be informed of and promptly provided access to the following interim remedies:

- options for on- and/or off-campus medical, counseling and other related services, including access to a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner;
- if any party resides in University housing, options for alternate housing arrangements, including immediate relocation to different University housing;
- options for altering academic class schedules/obligations;
- options for alternative transportation;
- options for seeking assistance from local law enforcement and/or legal resources;
- options for receiving a University no-contact order;
- options for assistance with financial aid, visa and immigration;
- options for seeking a judicial no-contact, restraining and/or protective order.

The interim remedies described above are also available to student witnesses, respondents and/or charged parties.

Education and Training regarding Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking

The University offers ongoing education to students and employees to promote awareness of Prohibited Offenses. Such education includes definitions of the Prohibited Offenses and consent; best practices for risk reduction and safe and positive bystander intervention; and information concerning rights under Title IX. Several different types of campaigns are utilized throughout the year to include presentations, online programs, resource panels, and discussion groups. The goal of these campaigns and programs are to increase the understanding of topics relevant to, and skills for, addressing dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Active bystander intervention is provided ViSION and OPEN throughout the year.

Throughout the year 2015, ViSION, OPEN, and OGEC provided over thirty-six different programs that focused on the ongoing prevention and awareness of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, bystander intervention and information on risk reductions.

In 2016, Northeastern University created a new office, called the Office of Gender Equity and Compliance (OGEC), which conducts Title IX investigations, oversees Title IX compliance, and, provides training and education to all members of the University community regarding Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking. OGEC created a new position of Assistant Vice President for Title IX Initiatives and Title IX Coordinator, and after a national search, Mark Jannoni was selected to fill this position. The OGEC office is housed at 106 West Village A, North, Unit 106 and can be reached at (617.373.4644 or titleix@northeastern.edu).

Northeastern University is committed to fostering a campus climate of mutual tolerance and respect. As part of the University's ongoing efforts, the University collected student input about sexual violence response, programming and education. Our assessment included: focus group sessions, input from student leaders, and a review of the research of prevention efforts in this area.

Northeastern is committed to sexual violence prevention. The Violence Support, Intervention and Outreach Network (ViSION) has existed as a way for students to access resources, support and reporting options for sexual violence over the past five years. Building upon ViSION's work, the University created a space designed to further these efforts. The ViSION Resource Center houses information about sexual violence resources and reporting options for Northeastern students. It will also be serving as a central space for sexual violence prevention programming and dialogue. The ViSION Resource Center is primarily staffed by the Office of Prevention and Education at Northeastern (OPEN) where a new staff position was added specializing in sexual violence prevention. The Violence Prevention and Intervention Coordinator is focused on enhancing efforts in this area. The ViSION Resource Center is located at 106 St. Stephen Street, Boston, MA on Monday-Friday 12:00pm – 5:00pm or by prior arrangement.

Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act

In keeping with the federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, the University Police maintains records provided by the Massachusetts Sex Offender Registry Board of registered sex offenders who have indicated that they are employed or enrolled at Northeastern University. Any member of the University community who wishes to review these records should contact the Associate Director of the Police Department during normal business hours. Northeastern University Workplace Violence Policy

Northeastern University is committed to promoting a safe workplace for all faculty, staff, students and visitors. It is the University's goal to create a workplace free from violence, threats of violence, harassment, intimidation and other disruptive behavior. Northeastern University will not tolerate violence or the threat of violence in the workplace. The University expressly prohibits violence, threats of violence, hostile behavior, harassment, intimidation, on or off campus, or damage to University property. Violence or threatening behavior can include physical acts of violence, gestures, intimidating presence, oral, written or electronic statements, sexual assaults and weapons possession.

The University will take appropriate action in response to reports of such incidents, which may include, but is not limited to, disciplinary action up to and including termination and /or criminal prosecution.

Faculty and staff play a major role in the University's efforts by complying with this policy and treating all threats seriously and reporting incidents immediately. It is the responsibility of all Managers and Supervisors to report acts of workplace violence, including violent, threatening, harassing, intimidating or other disruptive behaviors. Faculty and Staff are expected to report any conduct that is inappropriate and/or causes concern. Imminent threats, violent incidents, or dangerous or emergency situations should be reported immediately to Northeastern University Police at 617.373.3333.

Verbal abuse, perceived intimidation, harassment or other non-emergency situations should be reported immediately to the immediate supervisor, manager, the Office of Institutional Diversity and Inclusion and/or Human Resources Management. For all other situations, or if you are not sure, call Human Resources Management at 617.373.2230, or the Northeastern University Police Department at 617.373.2121. Northeastern University offers all employees counseling services and confidential referrals through the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) for support call 877.739.3989 or for additional information, please contact Human Resources Management at 617.373.2230.

Procedures for Missing Students Residing on Campus

If a member of the University community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing the Northeastern University Police Department should be contacted immediately at 617.373.2121. An incident report will be generated and an investigation will be initiated in order to attempt to locate the missing student. Any person receiving information that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, this information should immediately be reported to the Northeastern University Police Department (617.373.2121, 716 Columbus Ave, 100 CP, Boston, MA 02115). The Northeastern University Police Department has a detailed and specific protocol for conducting missing persons investigations, utilizing a wide range of electronic resources as well as making personal contact with friends, classmates, co-workers and relatives.

When registering the name of a person as an emergency contact in the online registration process through the MyNEU portal, students also have the option to confidentially identify an individual to be contacted by Northeastern in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If the student confidentially identifies an individual to be contacted in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours, their contact information will only

be accessible to authorized campus officials, and that this information may not be disclosed, except to law enforcement personnel in furtherance of a missing person investigation.

If the Northeastern University Police Department determines that a student is missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours the Boston Police Department, the police department of the community where the missing student maintains a home of record, and the contact person the student designated to be contacted in the event the student is determined to be missing, will be notified no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to have been missing for 24 hours, and if the missing student is under the age of 21 a missing person notice will be posted on the national police information network. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, Northeastern will notify the student's parent or legal guardian, and the student's contact person, if he or she has registered one, immediately after the Northeastern University Police Department has determined that the student has been missing for more than 24 hours.

Drug, Alcohol, and No Smoking Policies

On University premises or at University sponsored activities, the following acts are prohibited:

- Distribution, possession or use of any illegal drug or controlled substances;
- Providing alcoholic beverages to individuals under 21 years of age, or possession of alcoholic beverages by individuals under 21 years of age; or
- Possession of an open container of an alcoholic beverage in a public place, public intoxication, driving while intoxicated and drinking alcoholic beverages in an unlicensed public place.
- Smoking on any and all Northeastern University property is prohibited.

In addition to imposition of disciplinary sanctions under University procedures, including suspension or separation from the University for such Acts, students and employees may face prosecution and imprisonment under Federal and Massachusetts laws which make such acts criminal offenses.

Northeastern University works to provide a drug-free workplace for all University employees and students. University Health and Counseling Services and Human Resources Management provide resources for treatment and referral for students and employees with substance abuse problems. Educational programs for students, employees and managers are presented through UHCS, HRM and the Office for Student Affairs and cover the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse, the availability of assistance for counseling and rehabilitation, and penalties for violating University policies.

Prevention, Education & Treatment

Northeastern University has developed a comprehensive approach to alcohol prevention and education modeled after NIAAA Task Force report recommendations which strongly supports the use of programs with multiple complementary components that target: (1) individuals, including at-risk or alcohol-dependent drinkers, (2) the student population as a whole, and (3) the college and the surrounding community. Specifically, alcohol and other drug education, prevention, intervention and treatment efforts at Northeastern include:

- Assessment, brief intervention and referral services at the Office of Prevention and Education at Northeastern
- Clinical assessment, short-term counseling and referral services at the University Health and Counseling Services
- Campus-wide programming providing facts/data, encouraging informed decisions
- Orientation, freshmen seminars, residence hall programming, fraternity/sorority life presentations, athletics
- Required online alcohol education program for all incoming students
- Customized presentations that combine interaction with normative feedback (using PRS remotes)
- Peer led alcohol education program designed to help students identify alcohol emergencies and call for assistance

Policy Development and Enforcement

The Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution impose disciplinary sanctions for student violations of the University's AOD policies. Sanctioning of students in violation of any alcohol or drug related policies may include a combination of **Active Sanctions**: Sanctions that require work on the student's part to complete. These include, but are

not limited to, educational sanctions, such as attending classes or writing research or reflection papers, performing mandated service, or paying a monetary fine and **Inactive Sanctions**: Sanctions that, by themselves, do not require work on the student's part to complete. These include, but are not limited to, written warnings, disciplinary probation, deferred suspension, suspension, and expulsion. These sanctions may put restrictions on students, such as limiting access to campus recreational facilities, residence or dining halls, or the ability to hold student leadership positions.

The Northeastern University Police Department (NUPD) runs alcohol suppression operations throughout the year, every year, near campus retail alcohol outlets with the purpose of reducing the procurement of alcohol to underage individuals. The laws against the sale of alcohol to minors, procurement of alcohol to minors, and minors in possession of alcohol are enforced either through the University's discipline office or through the local court. NUPD forwards all incident reports involving cases of student alcohol or other drug possession, consumption, underage purchase, etc., to the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution for adjudication.

Annually, all Resident Directors and Residents Assistants are provided aggressive training in the University's policy around student alcohol and drug use and how to enforce the policy among the residential population. RAs document any incidences of student behavior appearing to be in violation of alcohol and drug use policies and forward all reports to the Office for Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution for adjudication.

Through strategic initiatives to mitigate negative student behavior in the community, the University partners with local Boston Police to patrol off campus parties and respond swiftly and aggressively to any disruptive behavior. Students are held accountable to the Student Code of Conduct whether off campus or on and so any violation of the University Alcohol and Other Drug policies and referred for adjudication.

Other Programming

Alcohol-free events and activities are created and promoted on a consistent and ongoing basis through efforts of the Center for Student Involvement.

The campus offers a student center, recreation center, and an alcohol-free nightclub, all with expanded hours.

Bias Motivated Incidents

Bias motivated incidents are defined as incidents involving vandalism, theft, intimidation, harassment, and assault that are motivated by race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, disability, national origin, or gender identity.

Reported Hate Crimes

Unfounded Crimes

A crime is considered unfounded for Clery Act purposes only when law enforcement personnel make a formal determination that the report is false or baseless. Crime reports can be properly determined to be false only if the evidence from a complete and thorough investigation establishes that the crime reported was not, in fact, completed or attempted in any manner. Crime reports can be determined to be baseless only if the allegations reported did not meet the elements of the offense or were improperly classified as crimes in the first place.

Fire Safety in On-Campus Residence Halls

The Northeastern University Fire Safety Unit administers an aggressive program of regular inspection, testing and maintenance of University premises, especially residence facilities, to ensure compliance with applicable fire and life safety codes and standards, conducting regular egress drills and providing a variety of educational and training programs for students, faculty and staff.

Fire Alarm and Suppression Systems:

All on-campus residence halls are equipped with both automatic and manually operated fire alarm notification devices and sprinkler systems which meet and in many cases exceed state and local building and fire safety codes. The fire alarm systems in all on-campus residence facilities consist of horns and strobe lights alerting residents to an alarm and are also remotely monitored by the University's computerized campus-wide alarm monitoring system at the Police Operations Center, which is designated by the Boston Fire Department as an approved proprietary supervising station for receiving fire alarms. All fire alarm systems contain emergency batteries to ensure operation during a power outage, and most facilities also have emergency generators designed to automatically activate whenever there is a power outage. These back-up batteries and generators will operate life safety systems, including fire safety equipment and emergency exit lighting. On-campus residence halls are also equipped with fire-rated smoke/fire doors designed to impede the spread of smoke and fire. Regular and frequent inspections are conducted by the Fire Safety Unit, Residential Life staff and Facilities staff who report fire hazards in residence halls and facilitate prompt resolution. Hi-rise residence halls are also equipped with smoke-control and reduction mechanisms designed to further minimize the spread of smoke and fire. Upon receipt of a fire alarm, Police Officers are immediately dispatched and the Boston Fire Department is notified.

Northeastern's on-campus housing consists of a variety of configurations, including traditional dormitory-style buildings, former apartment buildings acquired and renovated by the University, and newly-constructed apartment style and suite style facilities. Each facility is equipped with the fire and life safety systems required by the building codes. More extensive fire sprinkler systems than required by building codes have been installed in older facilities.

Fire safety equipment is reviewed regularly to identify locations where enhancements such as additional sprinkler and smoke detection systems beyond those required by building codes are appropriate and plans for such enhancements are integrated into the university's annual facilities maintenance project plan. Policies on Rules for Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames:

Only a limited number of appliances approved by Underwriters Laboratories are permitted within the Residential Life system, and smoking of any substance is not permitted inside any campus building. Open flame containers or items are prohibited. Prohibited personal items include: plastic milk crates and stackable storage containers that are not fire resistant, non-metal waste baskets, candles, incense, halogen lamps, halogen bulbs, sun lamps, immersion heaters, space heaters, electric percolators, electric frying pans, hot plates, string lights of any kind, and student owned air conditioners.

Certain additional cooking appliances are prohibited in traditional dormitory-style rooms, such as microwave ovens, toaster ovens, coffee makers, and George Foreman grills, but are permitted in the apartment style facilities. Residents are reminded to use extension cords only if they bear the UL label. Never run cords under rugs or across doorways and use cords appropriately designed for the electrical load. For a detailed list of approved appliances for each facility and policy statements please refer to *A Guide to Residence Hall Living*.

Fire Safety Training and Evacuation Plans for Residence Hall Staff and Residents:

The Northeastern University Police Department's Crime Prevention Coordinator provides training for Residence Assistants during the annual RA training just prior to the beginning of the academic year. A PowerPoint program entitled *Campus*

Orientation for Public Safety for RA's serves as the outline for this training and is posted to the Blackboard application of the Department of Residence Life as a resource for the student and professional staff of the Department throughout the year. This training includes instructions that all residents and staff are to evacuate immediately upon activation of any fire alarm.

The University Fire Safety Officer regularly reviews evacuation plans for all on-campus residence halls and evacuation plans are posted in each residence hall. Procedures for student housing evacuation are as follows and are to be followed by all students and employees within residence halls, and dining halls that are directly attached to residence halls: At the sound of the alarm, move quickly and quietly to your closest exit, including the alarmed emergency exits. Close doors behind you as you leave. In an orderly fashion, follow the direction of your hall staff, NUPD, or City of Boston Fire Department and wait for further instructions. If possible, wear a coat and shoes and carry a towel to use in case of smoke.

If you are away from your room when the alarm sounds, proceed to the nearest exit without returning to your room. The alarm signal is the same for a drill as for an actual emergency. The following residence halls at Northeastern utilize fire escapes as an alternative means of egress: 153 Hemenway Street, 319 Huntington Avenue, 337 Huntington Avenue, 407 Huntington Avenue, Burstein Hall, Rubenstein Hall, Kennedy Hall, and Light Hall. Access to the fire escapes is through dedicated windows in these residence halls. For a complete list of all dedicated windows in these residence halls, contact the Department of Residential Life (617.373.2814).

Fire egress drills are scheduled at least once each semester and include guidance from Northeastern University Police staff and Residence Life staff, so all residents and employees can practice the evacuation procedure on campus, to include being shown the proper exits in the building and where to safely assemble once outside the building. Residents and employees are also trained through the fire egress drills and through residential hall meetings where the fire extinguishers are located within each building. Residents and employees in on-campus housing, and dining facilities that are attached to residence halls are also routinely provided with a variety of fire safety information and fire safety principles during all Crime Prevention tables and presentations provided by the Northeastern Police Departments Crime Prevention and Community Engagement Unit through the use of brochures, PowerPoints, and social media. These trainings include the proper use of fire extinguishers and evacuation procedures.

Fires in On-Campus Residential Facilities:

Receipt of fire alarms by the university's automatic alarm system or by persons who report the presence of smoke result in an immediate response by The Northeastern University Police Department to investigate the cause of the alarm. In the case of an actual fire an incident report is generated and a detailed record of the fire is maintained. A record of all fires in on-campus residence hall facilities is also included in the public log of crimes and other incidents maintained by the Police Department, which is available for public viewing during normal business hours. Anyone observing a fire in a residence hall should dial 911 immediately and activate the fire alarm by operating the nearest manual pull station if the fire alarm is not already sounding. Pull stations are typically located near doors leading to stairways and exits. Upon hearing a fire alarm all occupants should evacuate the building by stairs and exits immediately. Federal law and Residence Life policy require staff members who discover evidence of a past fire which was extinguished before a fire alarm was activated to report their observations to the University Police (617.373.2121). Such reports also result in an investigation and an entry being made in the public log.

Plans for future improvement:

As funding becomes available the University plans to convert older horn/strobe based fire alarm notification circuits to speaker/strobe circuits. This feature will allow emergency responders to broadcast live or recorded messages and instructions to building occupants. The University also plans to upgrade smoke detectors in older living units from local only to system based units that report off-normal conditions to our proprietary supervising station through the fire alarm control panel.

During the three-year reporting period covered by this report the following fires were reported in on-campus residence halls.

For the purpose of this report, incidents have been included which were reported by city police agencies to have occurred on public property within the area bounded by Columbus Avenue to the south, Ruggles Street to the west, The Fenway to the north, and Westland Avenue/Massachusetts Avenue to the east.

Note 2: The term Non-Campus Building or Property means any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by the University or any building or property owned or controlled by the University and used in direct support of educational purposes, frequented by students, but not in the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the main campus.

Note 3: The statistics were compiled by first reviewing reports from case files of the University Police Department. Other university departments and individuals with significant responsibility for student and campus activities were then provided with reporting forms to be submitted to the Northeastern University Police Department for compilation. Finally, other law enforcement agencies were asked to provide statistics for applicable incidents on public property and non-campus property. All records were then analyzed to eliminate duplication.

Note 4: Rape/Sexual Assault statistics include third party and anonymous reports.

Note 5: Most of the Burglary incidents involved unforced entry into unlocked and/or unattended rooms or offices.

Note 6: These statistics include incidents reported to local authorities where students are studying abroad.

Note 7: Fondling is a recent addition to the Crime Statistics and in previous years was accumulated together with forcible Rape cases.
